He was homeless, lived in a shelter for awhile and then was couch surfing when he first joined our Summer Youth Ecology Corps program in the summer of 2015. After the summer program, he was invited to participate in CCNB's year-round program.



He had challenges in our program, and gives credit to guidance from his teachers with helping him to turn around his attitude and stay with the work. He tries hard, and that is the most important factor in succeeding in our program.

He has been working on a Natural Resource Crew since last fall, and is also taking classes at College of Marin. He was able to register at CoM with help from one of his ESL teachers, who helped him to order his high school transcripts and complete the application. His interests are wide-ranging, and particularly include music.

Reggie went from having a difficult time to being one of CCNB's best workers. In fact, in June he was selected for an internship with the Golden Gate National Recreation Area! He is interested in permanent work with a land management agency like the GGNRA, and this internship will certainly give him a leg up when he begins to look for a permanent position.
